Our Holiday Wish for You... The Fullness of the Web of Life to Sustain You and Lead You to Great Joy and Gratitude!



As time passes, just as in a garden, new growth and new plantings are necessary to season change in a spiritual community. The Marquette UU is no different and we are in the midst of big changes in leadership and membership of committees essential to the health of our "Spiritual Garden."

In coming weeks you will be hearing more about these changes. Old and new members will be invited to consider various committees and positions and step in to give support as past members step away.

This is a great way to get to know other members better, come to feel more at home in the spiritual community and help make changes and add new dimensions to spiritual practice at the UU. Many people feel hesitant at volunteering for new roles as they are uncertain of what is required. This year we will be applying the "apprentice model", that is, pairing new committee participants with experienced members to help answer questions and familiarize new folks with the "secret knowledge" necessary to perform well.

These are the committees and number of openings as well as a brief description of function. We also list some of the past committees that have grown dormant from loss of interest and membership decline.

Building & Grounds: The B&G Committee is responsible for the care and maintenance of the building and grounds (not including cleaning), and for planning improvements along with the BOT and the congregation.
Community Support & Outreach: Members find ways to strengthen and deepen the interconnections among MqtUU members and friends. This work includes embracing newcomers to the congregation and informing them about UUism, our MqtUU community and the process of joining. Committee members also develop means of mutual care-giving and plan social events to enliven and enrich our community life together.
Finance: The Committee meets at least twice a year to review financial reports and procedures, and formulate recommendations for the BoT on how the Congregation's financial resources are being managed.
Membership: Members greet visitors each Sunday, hold New Unitarian Universalist (UU) classes as well as membership ceremonies at least twice a year, help visitors and members find places to connect within the congregation, provide appropriate publications relating to membership, maintain contact with friends and

members who come irregularly, provide caring for those in need.

**Music:** Members offer support to the Music Coordinator by planning music for Sunday services, working closely with service leaders; inviting special guest musicians; rehearsing with adults, children, and/or youth, and providing accompaniment on Sunday mornings. (The music folks always welcome instrumentalists and singers!)

**Sunday Service:** This committee plans and coordinates Sunday mornings, working with the musicians, speakers and RE to coordinate the services. They also plan the Forums that take place before the services, provide hosts and invite speakers on a wide variety of topics of potential interest to the congregation. **Stewardship:** This Committee is responsible for creating the structure under which members and friends are asked to make personal financial commitments to support the Congregation's operations over the next fiscal year. Generosity is central to healthy spiritual life, and the committee works to help people make financial support of our UU community an intentional part of their spiritual practice.

Consider what interests you, what you excel at naturally, and what fits with your time available. Imagine yourself helping shape the upcoming year of Marquette UU and benefitting by a deeper spiritual practice through service and knowing your fellow members better. Reflect on how your participation can move the community in new directions.

When the call goes out, please consider responding with a big YES! We need you.

**Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF) members who are in prison** have a very different experience of the holiday season than most of us in the free world. For the third year in a row each of CLF's incarcerated members (825 this year) will receive a holiday card from the larger CLF and UU community. We will use flat, <u>non-glitter</u> types of cards with <u>white envelopes</u>. Using <u>pens</u> only, we can sign our first names and/or write seasonal messages. The cards will be placed into <u>stamped</u>, <u>un-addressed envelopes</u> (not even a return address).

One of the Faith in Action folks will place all the cards into a larger envelope, and mail our package to CLF no later than December 7<sup>th</sup> to: CLF UU, Holiday Card Project, <u>24</u> <u>Farnsworth St, Boston, MA 02210</u>-1409. (CLF staff and volunteers will address all envelopes by hand, hoping to bring a bit of cheer to our incarcerated members, many of whom are lonely and without support.)



## **FROM:** Dave Stensaas, Vice President Board of Trustees **B&G** Committee



At its first two meetings this year, the Board of Trustees (BoT) resolved to undertake a signature project utilizing funds left to the congregation by the late Joan Steindler, and renovations to the sanctuary were selected as the project to focus upon. In early November the two principal architects from Studio RAD (Rom

Architecture and Design) met with a group of four MUUC members to view the building and hear what ideas the members had in mind for the project. For many years there have been attempts to undertake such a project, but no significant funding was available. The BoT voted at their regular November meeting (held Sat. 11/18) to go forward with a proposal for architectural services from Studio RAD (Rom Architecture and Design), which will provide design alternatives that will fit into various budget thresholds, including schematic building plans, interior computer visualizations showing the volume and organization of space, flooring and lighting options, and up to 3 plan options and up to 3 revision cycles of the singular chosen option.

The design work will begin with a comprehensive meeting with the congregation to explore ideas/desires for the space, and then floor plan studies to discover the optimal programmatic and design layout. A forum for the congregation will be scheduled, and at this time **Sunday, December 10th** is being considered for that forum/meeting after the regular service. The purpose of the project is for the design of interior renovations to the building that will embody our congregation's needs within the existing building site, focusing on the main sanctuary space and its adjacencies. The commitment to the design services does not commit the congregation to a construction project, but if we choose to go forward with renovations we will have a well thought-out plan to execute if and when we go forward with the work. Several alternatives will be produced for the psychic and/or physical separation/demarcation of the sanctuary from the rest of the space. The project schedule is 4-8 weeks for completion of the final design/pricing drawing set. Once completed it will be up to the congregation as to how to proceed, and another forum will be scheduled to review the options.

Northwest Arkansas Worker Justice Center: Magaly Licolli was born in Leon, Guanajuato, Mexico. She's been living in Arkansas for 13 years, and throughout those years working closely with the immigrant community, she learned the struggles of the immigrant community in this area. After hearing shocking stories of poultry workers, she began learning and being involved with labor organizing and became passionate about it.

Magaly achieved an Arts and Science degree in 2013, and thanks to her artistic career and love for social justice, she's bringing more artistic work for workers to use arts as a form of healing and empowerment; her passion and leadership working with immigrants are a key

element to continue growing the organization.

She's currently working to bring the GFPP (Good Food Purchasing Program) campaign to Arkansas by collaborating with local farmers, environmentalist and other allies to keep supporting workers efforts in quest of dignity and respect in poultry plants.



<u>Greater Minnesota Worker Center</u>: Ahmed Ali has been the Executive Director of Greater Minnesota Worker Center since January, 2017. He has served as the Lead Staff organizer from December, 2014 to December, 2016 and as a founding board member and the board vice chair for the two years before 2013-2014. He has a decade of experience in nonprofit management, planning, community and labor organizing. Ahmed serves on the board of various organizations including Centracare Health System, Stearns County Public Health and St Cloud Math and Science Academy, a

charter school in St Cloud.

Ahmed is pursuing Master of Business Administration at St Cloud State University and has studied Mass Communications (BS), Political Science (BA) and International Relations (BA) at the same university. Ahmed lives in St Cloud with his wife, a social worker and three children aged 0 to 5 years of age.

#### ENGERY TRANSITION IN MICHIGAN: REGIONAL & STATE POLICIES AT PLAY

Margrethe Kearney will introduce and discuss a few of the most relevant policies influencing the transition to renewable energy in the state of

Michigan. She will focus on PURPA (Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act of 1978), explain why it is important for distributed and renewable energy in Michigan and then discuss a few of the cases cases currently under review by the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC). The MPSC's mission is to protect the public by ensuring safe, reliable, and accessible energy at reasonable rates for Michigan's residents.

Ms. Kearney is a Senior Staff Attorney working in the Environmental Law and Policy Center's Grand Rapids office. Ms. Kearney was previously a Counsel at the Latham & Watkins firm in the Environment, Land & Resources Department, focusing on environmental enforcement, environmental litigation and advising on environmental aspects of corporate and finance transactions. She represented clients on cases involving the Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act, CERCLA and valuation of environmental claims in bankruptcy proceedings. Before attending Harvard Law School, she worked as an associate research economist at the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago.
