Update on Meeting House Repairs and Renovations



On November 1st architects from Studio RAD (Rom Architecture and Design) will be visiting the Meeting House to look at the sanctuary and provide the Board with some alternatives and cost estimates for renovating the portion of the sanctuary used for presenting services and music. The idea of renovating that space was a hot

topic when we first began attending services (early 2011), and now it is something that actually can happen due to a bequest from Joan Steindler that included the direction to do something significant - in terms of tangible projects - with her gift to the congregation. At this time I'm not sure when the "site visit" will occur on the 1st, but as soon as we have a firm time we can send out a message to members and if you are interested in attending you can come. Our current Music Director is planning to attend, and hopefully I won't be the only Board member there.

In late May a professional building inspector did a thorough inspection of the meeting house and grounds, and shortly thereafter provided a detailed report of the findings. The report provided updates on the condition of the interior by room, and systems (heating, electrical, plumbing), as well as the exterior (roof, siding, facia, soffits), and various aspects of the grounds. The report prioritized items to be addressed in terms of repairs and maintenance. The Board determined at its first meeting in July to act on various high-priority repairs to the exterior of the building - particularly damaged areas of the roof, facia, and soffits – before winter. A contractor submitted an estimate in August and the Board accepted it, and the work began on October 20th. It's not a big project, but it is definitely important to keeping the building from damage by the elements.

The report also recommended re-staining and sealing the interior window trim. The Board hired our cleaning contractor and her husband to perform the work after they offered to do the work at a very reasonable price. That work was completed in late September. A few other recommendations of the Inspection Report for small repairs impacting the safety of occupants/visitors were performed in the past couple of months. With these items taken care of the only outstanding issue we need to deal with is parking lot maintenance. The Board has a bid from the contractor that performed the most recent sealing work on the lot, and direction to proceed with the work is pending action by the President of the Board.

The Board discussed and debated how we would proceed with sealing and perpetual maintenance of the parking lot, as it is an annual need and a major annual expense. After two months of investigation and deliberations the Board has decided to continue sealing and crack repairs on about 2/3 of the existing parking lot, and forego that maintaining the rest, which will still provide plenty of parking (at least 50 spaces, on average 26 are occupied on a Sunday morning) and save the congregation tens of thousands of dollars over the next several years. The portion of the lot that is not sealed will be maintained for weeds and it will still be available for overflow parking, slowly breaking down and letting water percolate through to the earth, and in twenty years it may be more like a gravel lot than a paved lot. But that's okay! If it's not being used money is being wasted to seal it, and if in the future there is a need to re-surface that area that will not be difficult as it is a compacted and graded lot.

View from a New Board Member

My last three months have been a journey into a deeper understanding of the workings of the Marquette Unitarian Universalist Congregation. My service started with a MqtUU Leader Retreat with the Rev. Emmy Lou Belcher, who encouraged us to lighten up and have more fun in our congregation. She believes congregations grow by attracting folks through laughter and happiness. "It's a natural draw," she said. To that end, we brainstormed a list of "fun" activities to share throughout the year. By now you may have enjoyed a Sunday morning breakfast or two with us prior to services with the group. Coming soon will be a Game Night in November and a Gingerbread House Decorating Party with our families in December.

One highlight of our Fall has been the "Class & Classism in UU Life" course facilitated by gg gordon as an expression of her Faith in Action committee work. She took an idea that she learned about at our last General Assembly and brought it back to share with us. Fourteen attended the first class and it will continue over the next few months. All are welcome to join at any time.

Much has been happening on the community service level too. Many participated in helping host Room at the Inn at our church, offering food and shelter to those who find themselves homeless in Marquette. Michelle Halley and Sarah Johnson pour so much effort into making this happen twice a year at the Marquette UU Meeting House. And the whole congregation benefits too by learning so much about class differences and opening our hearts to others while giving shelter.

My journey as a new Board of Trustee continued into our realm of money management. I found understanding our money flow to be my personal challenge. (I have never liked math or numbers, but I applied myself to it). This year we have a relatively new Treasurer, Gary Stark, and an experienced administrative assistant, Heidi Gould, who are helping to keep our organization running. We also have an accountant keeping an eye on things. I am deeply grateful for their service. We do have money challenges as a congregation and we may need to make some difficult decisions about money matters over this year or the next. On the other hand, people can be surprisingly generous too. This story continues.

The intense wind storm of October 24th, has left us with some minor building damage and a fair amount of tree damage around the property. There are always unexpected challenges in life. Your Board and others have been organizing the repair process, the re-establishment of power and phone service, and figuring out how to address the damaged tree issues.

Finally, one idea that I have been carrying with me from our initial retreat with Rev. Emmy Lou is to "celebrate whomever shows up." Let's celebrate and enjoy one another! There is so much richness of experience to be found in just one other person. I encourage you to engage more with each other and support each other as we create the community which makes us proudly the Marquette UU Congregation.
