Sunday, September 16 11am Service: "Robert Green Ingersoll: Great American Infidel" Jane Shoup



Robert Green Ingersoll, although little remembered today, was the foremost orator and political speech-maker of late 19th century America. He was a controversial figure, but very prominent and highly regarded, even amongst those who disagreed with him. He crisscrossed the country and spoke before packed houses on topics ranging from Shakespeare to Thomas Paine, from Darwin to the rights of women and African Americans. He was the friend of presidents, literary giants like Mark Twain, captains of industry like Andrew Carnegie, and feminists like Elizabeth Cady Stanton. He was a tireless advocate of reason and science. He also praised the virtues of marriage and family life. Many of his ideas were far ahead of his time and, I will argue, applicable to our current situation.

Jane R. Shoup is Professor Emerita of Biological Sciences at Purdue University Calumet (now Purdue University Northwest), Hammond, IN, where she taught for 36 years. She holds the AB in Biology from the University of Rochester, and a PhD in Zoology from the University of Chicago. A lifelong Unitarian, Jane and her husband Stefan live in retirement in rural NE central WI in a solar home on 150 wooded acres. For the past 17 years they have hosted Purdue students each spring in a weeklong field ecology course on their property. Jane has presented a number of courses through the LIFE (Learning Is ForEver) program at UW- Stevens Point on topics including "Darwin and His Legacy", "The Sixth Mass Extinction", "Living Within Limits", and "A Journey Through Time: Running the Colorado River in Grand Canyon" She has spoken at numerous UU fellowships throughout Wisconsin and Upper Michigan in the last several years.



Michael "Little Feather" Giron is the first Indigenous Water Protector who was arrested in relation to the DAPL pipeline resistance at Standing Rock to be sentenced to a substantial prison term. He is currently incarcerated at USP Hazleton in West Virginia, a maximum-security prison over 1,000 miles from his home. At our UU General Assembly this June, in a nearly unanimous vote, delegates from our congregations

adopted an important Action of Immediate Witness. This AIW calls us now to act in solidarity with Water Protector Little Feather.

USP Hazleton has been on lockdown since August 6th. Little Feather's family, spiritual community, and even lawyer cannot reach him by phone, email, or visit. Visiting is suspended until further notice with no timeline or reasoning given. As part of the lock down, Little Feather has been denied access to his Indigenous spiritual practices, including inipi and pipe ceremony. Please be direct and unflinching in regards to Little Feather needing contact with his attorney, loved ones, and ceremony, but do not be confrontational for the sake of his safety. Michigan Ballot Initiatives for November 2018 Election

Our general election in Michigan will be on Tuesday, November 6th. Here is the status of the ballot initiatives that have been proposed for this upcoming election.

On the Ballot for sure:

Legalization of Marijuana [Marijuana Legalization Initiative] Citizens' Redistricting [Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission Initiative]

On the Ballot Unless MI Legislature approves by September 5, 2018:

Paid Sick Leave Initiative [This is one of the initiatives we collected signatures for in January at Women's March and elsewhere! We helped to make this happen!]

Signatures Still being Counted:

Michigan Minimum Wage Initiative [This the other initiative for which we collected signatures in January.] On May 21, 2018, sponsors filed an estimated 373,507 signatures for this ballot initiative. At least 252,523 of the signatures (67.6 percent) need to be found valid.

Michigan Voting Policies in State Constitution Initiative This ballot measure would add 8 constitutional guarantees re: voting to MI Constitution:

- vote using secret ballot
- military members and overseas voters receive an absentee ballot at least 45 days before the election;
- register to vote by mail at least 15 days before an election;
- register to vote in person during the final 14 days before an election
- the option to vote straight party in partisan general elections;
- <u>automatic voter registration</u> when conducting business with the state regarding a driver's license or personal identification card;
- absentee voting for all voters during the 40 days prior to an election; and
- the auditing of election results.

The PAC leading the support campaign, Promote the Vote, reported filing more than 430,000 signatures for the ballot initiative. At least 315,654 (73.41 percent) of the signatures need to be valid for the initiative to make the ballot.
